




Annual Report 2016



Aims, Mission and Objectives

The European Federation of Internal Medicine (EFIM) was established in 1996 through a merger of its predecessor AEMI and the Forum of Presidents of National Internal Medicine Societies in Europe.

From the beginning, the aims of the organisation were as laid down in the Statutes:

- To promote internal medicine scientifically (but also ethically and professionally)
- To publish research and resolutions
- To organize meetings and congresses
- To establish communication between specialists
- To provide information to private and public organisations

The purpose of EFIM is to re-emphasize the importance of internal medicine in patient care in a world of increasing specialisation. Education, research and the promotion of internal medicine are at the heart of the EFIM mission. The European School of Internal Medicine, the annual Clinical Research Course and the EFIM Congress have become popular events, bringing together internists from across Europe and around the world. EFIM will continue to build programmes that will raise the profile of internal medicine and encourage greater collaboration of European internists in years to come.

Internal medicine will remain cornerstone of every national health care system.

EFIM were made during the year. Revised Statutes, which include changes in the membership structure and voting rules, were approved at an extraordinary

General Assembly in Brussels in March. At the General Assembly in Amsterdam in August, Nicola Montano, from Italy, became the new President-Elect and Antonio Baptista was re-elected as Treasurer. Luis Campos from Portugal has been appointed as the new Chair of the Professional Issues and Quality of Care Working Group, taking over from Mark Kramer who chaired the working group for several years.

It can be fairly stated that the highlight of 2016 was the first independent European Congress of Internal Medicine in Amsterdam. The congress

was a major success and we are grateful to Mark Kramer and Frank Bosch, our Past President, who led the organisation of the event. The European Curriculum of Internal Medicine was approved by European Union of Medical Specialists (UEMS) Council in October. This work was carried out by the European Board of Internal Medicine (EBIM), which is a joint venture of EFIM and UEMS Section of Internal Medicine. The new curriculum is an important step

The European Journal of Internal Medicine has continued to do well, although a slight decrease in the impact factor occurred in 2016. It is impossible to assess the relevance of such decline in a single year, so we will have to remain hopeful for a recovery Several changes in the governance and leadership of in 2017. 
Report from the European Board of Internal Medicine

In recent years, EFIM has formed a close collaboration with the European Union of Medical Specialists (UEMS) Section of Internal Medicine through the European Board of Internal Medicine (EBIM). The EBIM focuses primarily on postgraduate training and qualification in internal medicine and continuing professional development for internists.

During the past 2 years, the principal activity of EBIM has been the development of a European Curriculum in Internal Medicine. Following close collaboration with the EFIM member national societies, the curriculum was finally completed in April and was approved by the UEMS Council in October of 2016.

The next step will be the implementation of the curriculum in the European countries and work towards this important task is already underway by the EBIM. In a meeting in Reykjavik in July of 2016,

the future projects and strategies of EBIM were considered. This resulted in a proposal to establish a European Education Centre for Internal Medicine. In addition, the EBIM believes that a European diploma examination in internal medicine should be relaunched despite the earlier failure of this enterprise. Finally, there was a consensus that the EBIM needs to be strengthened in order to cope with increasing activities in the coming years and to facilitate the contribution from the member national internal medicine societies in the work. There was a consensus among the members of the EBIM to propose a drastic change in the composition of the Board by including representatives from all the member national societies. All these progressive changes in the structure and activities of the EBIM will be formally introduced to EFIM and the UEMS Section of Internal Medicine in 2017 for discussion and approval.



Rijk Gans will become President of EBIM in 2017, as the leadership of the Board alternates between EFIM and the UEMS Section of Internal Medicine every three years.





Revenues and Expenditures



Report from the European Congress of Internal Medicine in Amsterdam

More than 1200 internists from across Europe and the world gathered in Amsterdam to attend the 15th European Congress of Internal Medicine on September 1-2. Prof. Mark Kramer, the Chair of the ECIM 2016, and Dr. Frank Bosch, the EFIM President, welcomed the participants during the opening ceremony. The largest number of participants came from Portugal (319) and Turkey (273), followed by Spain (134), the Netherlands (85), Romania (47) and the UK (42).

The scientific programme focused on topics relevant for internal medicine in the 21st century, in line with the slogan of the congress: "Connecting with the Patient". 12 Plenary sessions, 24 parallel sessions and 2 workshops were presented by well know clinicians from around the world. Prof. Rudi Westendorp from the Center for Healthy Aging at the University of Copenhagen addressed the audience with his presentation entitled "Ageing People - Who is at Risk?", discussing innovative solutions for promoting healthy living and active aging. Prof. Victor Montori presented the challenges associated with caring for patients whose life is complex because of accumulation of multiple chronic conditions. Other sessions included global climate change and health, patient advocacy, and education in the 21st century. Participants at the congress had the honor to listen to Prof. Wouter Bos, Netherlands former Minister of Finance and Deputy Prime Minister, discussing the modern society, changing expectations and the impact on the medical sector. A one day Ultrasound for Internal Medicine Workshop was organised in collaboration with VU Amsterdam and Phillips on Sunday 4 September for all practicing internists and internists in training interested in gaining proficiency in the use of ultrasound in clinical practice.



A total of 1023 abstracts from authors in 45 different countries were accepted for electronic poster presentation. The greatest number of submitted abstracts came from Portugal, Spain and Turkey, followed by Tunisia, Greece and UK. During the congress, 3 outstanding posters were selected for presentation by the authors in a special session. gave 3 awards for best posters. Like in previous congresses, the best case reports were selected jointly by EFIM Young Internists and the European Journal of Case Reports in Internal Medicine. In addition to the inspiring and innovative lectures, the congress offered a serious game "The Battle", which was introduced using an interactive format developed by the Section of Acute Medicine of the Erasmus University Medical Centre in Rotterdam. In this battle, teams consisting of 3 to 4 participants competed with each other in treating acutely ill patients. The 3 winning teams received their prizes at the Best Poster Award session. During the congress, a Young Internists Corner was organised where varied and interactive programme of debates and meet-theexpert sessions were held. The young internists had the opportunity to debate on Choosing Wisely at the End-of-Life session with well-known experts.

The two-day event concluded on Saturday 3 September, with a short introduction of the new EFIM President, Prof. Runolfur Palsson, who welcomed the participants to the next European Congress of Internal Medicine in Milan in September of 2017. The congress was granted 12 CME credits by the European Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (EACCME) of the European Union of Medical Specialists (UEMS).

Advice Working Group Activities, 2016 Report

ADVICE for a Healthier Life: ADult Vaccination Campaign in Europe

Immunization is one of the most effective public health measures to prevent disease. Despite relatively good vaccination rates in childhood in many parts of the world, vaccines to prevent diseases are underused in the adult population and adult vaccination rates are still far below the target. The European Federation of Internal Medicine (EFIM) declared that "internal medicine must focus on better care for individuals, better health care for populations and lower costs".

Adult vaccination is a good example of a public health initiative aimed at reducing morbidity and mortality, but awareness of the need for adult vaccination and uptake of programmes across Europe is variable. The Adult Vaccination Campaign in Europe (ADVICE) was developed with the aim of raising awareness for adult vaccination and understanding the dynamics of the vaccination practices and the possible barriers against achieving targeted vaccination rates in Europe.

In this regard, the working group has published a review article in the European Journal of Internal Medicine to declare a leadership in this field and set the background scientific knowledge and practices. Leadership at the European level and a firm research and action agenda are crucial. The European Federation of Internal Medicine can take the lead as it has declared its interest in "better care for individuals and better health care for populations".

With this mission, the ADVICE Working Group is trying to build relationships with other global stakeholders and civil societies in the area of adult vaccination.

Exchange Programme, 2016 Report

The Exchange Programme remains a popular project among internal medicine trainees in Europe, providing them with an opportunity to gain additional knowledge and skills by experiencing medical and educational activities in another country. Furthermore, such experience is likely to enhance their professional development. Each national internal medicine society can select candidates for the programme with a maximum of 5 trainees per country. EFIM, FDIME and AMGEN Europe support the Exchange Programme with 20 scholarships of 600€. There

are over 30 hospitals across Europe participating in the Exchange Programme and are offering trainees a one-month stay. In 2016, we welcomed 4 new hospitals from Greece under the leadership of the Board of the Internal Medicine Society of Greece. Since January 2016, the EFIM Office has received more than 23 applications for participation in the Exchange Programme. EFIM strongly believes that this project will continue to grow in the future and will become one of EFIM's flagships.

FDIME Activities in 2016

The Foundation has provided 4 educational bursaries by rare diseases. In to young internists for participation in the European School of Internal Medicine (ESIM). The FDIME Cavalli from Milan, I intense inflammation in the Netherlands. Society cannot afford the fee for ESIM. The FDIME has supported Dr. Abire Allaoui from Morocco and Dr. Rita Alaseviciene from Lithuania to attend the Winter School in Riga, Latvia, in February 2016; and Dr. Hana Zoubeidi from Tunisia and Dr Gordana Kovacevic from Serbia to attend the Summer School in Sardinia, Italy, in June 2016.

The Foundation organised the 12th Clinical Research working on genetic factors in Seminar in Paris from 4 to 6 July 2016. There were 40 applications to attend the seminar; 17 applicants were selected, coming from 12 different European countries. The seminar comprised lectures and workshops given or moderated by senior academic workshops given or moderated by senior academic hall on 4 March 2016. The programme included lectures on various topics, including protection of persons in clinical research, clinical epidemiology, how to build a protocol, reflections on career development and how to publish a scientific paper. Short presentations

were made by the participants on their own work. The participants have anonymously given a very positive evaluation of the seminar.

The Foundation offers research grants to support young internists in their research projects on rare diseases in adults. The Foundation is pleased to acknowledge a partnership with "Association Enfance et Maladies Orphelines" (AEMO), a Swiss charity dedicated to helping patients and families stricken by rare diseases. In 2016, two 10,000€ grants were awarded. One of the grants will support Dr. Giulio Cavalli from Milan, Italy, who will study pathways of intense inflammation observed in adult Still's disease in the Netherlands. The second grant was presented to Dr. Maxime Samson from Dijon, France, who will work in Barcelona on the prospect of cellular therapy in giant cell arteritis.

During the European Congress of Internal Medicine in Amsterdam, the President of FDIME handed 20,000€ to Dr. Stéphanie Guillet, corresponding to the research grant awarded to her in 2015. Dr. Guillet is currently working on genetic factors in familial forms of severe systemic lupus erythematosus. In addition, prizes for the best poster were presented to young internists from Iceland, Switzerland and Israel. The Foundation organised a Benefit concert in the Geneva Victoria Hall on 4 March 2016. The profits from this event will be used to support the promotion of research in rare diseases. The Foundation wishes to thank everyone who has contributed to its success during the current period, including donors, professional organisations and members of the council.

European Medicines Agency



EFIM is a member of the Healthcare Professionals Working Group (HCPWG) of the European Medicines Agency (EMA). EFIM delegates at the HCPWG are Daniel Sereni (France) and Lorenzo Dagna (Italy).

The main objective of this working group is to facilitate communication between EMA and healthcare professionals. Important news on medicines like safety alerts are communicated and circulated to EFIM member states. EMA may also need an

advice from practising internists on a particular topic: in 2016, we provided input from internists on issues regarding diabetes, cancer, and treatment for severe bacterial infections. Furthermore, the HCPWG organises discussions with professionals and patients' representatives on EMA projects. Recent debates were dedicated to the involvement of academia in drug information and pharmacovigilance, personalised medicine and the use of social media for distributing information on prescription drugs.

2nd EFIM Day, Brussels 2016





The 2nd EFIM Day was held on 11 March 2016 at the EFIM Headquarters in Brussels, bringing together 55 participants from 23 EFIM member societies all over Europe. National Society Presidents, Board Members and Young Internists participated in a lively discussion on the Choosing Wisely Campaign, in addition to sharing ideas, networking and discussing the latest development in internal medicine.

The EFIM Day was opened by Dr. Frank Bosch, the EFIM President, who welcomed all the delegates to the EFIM Headquarters in Brussels. Frank presented the 2015 EFIM Annual Report, reflecting on the results of the collection of membership fees in 2015 and the evolution of the different activities and projects carried out at the EFIM office.

EFIM welcomed a new member on board, the Internal Medicine Society of Greece, who will improve the communication with Greek members and bring many internists on board.

Mark Kramer, the ECIM 2016 Chair, provided an update on the progress of the Amsterdam Congress and discussed the scientific pogramme



with the participants. Runolfur Palsson, the EFIM President-Elect, presented the European Board of Internal Medicine Curriculum Project, informing the participants that a final version of the curriculum, entitled "Training Requirements for the Specialty of Internal Medicine", had been submitted to the UEMS Council for discussion and approval at the upcoming meeting in Brussels in April of 2016.

Prof. Nicola Montano from the Italian Society of Internal Medicine gave the audience a unique insight into the Choosing Wisely Campaign from different perspectives, taking examples from the American Board of Internal Medicine, Swiss Society of General and Internal Medicine, Italian Federation of Associations of Hospital Internists (FADOI) and Italian Society of Internal Medicine (SIMI). Nicola presented "Choosing Wisely in Internal Medicine: European Campaign (5-steps-to do)".

Finally, Dr. Terje Peetso, Policy Officer from the Health and Wellbeing DG Communications Networks Content and Technology at the European Commission, presented a Keynote lecture on how digitisation in healthcare can help you and your patients from the perspective of the European Union. Dr. Peetso presented the eHealth Action Plan and other activities that the European Commission is currently undertaking to improve digitisation in the healthcare.

This was another fruitful EFIM Day which concluded with a networking cocktail, where the participants could further discuss important topics and share their ideas with peers from other European countries.

Winter and Summer Schools

ESIM Winter 2016

A second excellent European Winter School of Internal Medicine has taken place in Riga, Latvia in February of 2016. It was yet another intensive course of internal medicine, combined with an amazing social programme, allowing residents and faculty members to network, exchange experiences and ideas, debate and critically elaborate on subjects such as specialty curricula, working conditions, patients' management, health care systems and many more.

A total of 47 internal medicine trainees from 21 countries in Europe attended this outstanding course. The venue was remarkable, located in the heart of the historic city of Riga. The course was organised by the Latvian Society of Internal Medicine under the direction



of Dr. Ieva Ruza. The programme was outstanding, containing various formats of teaching. The School was opened by an introduction and pre-test conducted by the director, I. Ruza. The lectures included topics such as end-of-life decisions, hypertension, rapidly progressive glomerulonephritis, sepsis, bridging of inpatient and outpatient care, sleep apnea, vitamin D, hyponatremia, masks of endocrine disorders, acute porphyria and IgG4-related disease.

Each day was concluded by a round of residents' case presentations. An important part of the programme was an introduction of the European Young Internists, that was followed by a lecture and workshop entitled "Migration health and caring for refugees" by E. Biskup. The participants worked in small groups on prepared questions and presented their answers. This year, the programme was enriched by clinicopathological conferences by S. Rigby and I. Ruza, which permitted another interactive teaching option. The trainees

also had the opportunity to improve their clinical and diagnostics skills through workshops on the doctor as a patient led by C. Davidson, bedside ultrasound by A. Mueller-Marbach and ECG by V. Kokorin. The compassion of the participating professors once again met the inquisitiveness of the trainees.

A perfect social programme was prepared with a passion for detail, aiming to let the participants engage in the culture of Latvia and learn about the the history of Riga. In addition to a guided tour, a ballet performance "Anna Karenina" in the National Opera and Ballet, a jazz concert and a Gala dinner were organised for the entire team.

The Winter School reflected the beauty and creativity offered by EFIM. This international, interactive and truly inspiring event was enriched by tremendous efforts and academic excellence of the teachers.

Efficient lectures, workshops and group discussions reached everyone despite heterogeneous educational backgrounds and professional levels. The enthusiasm of all parties was tactile and very inspiring.









The great success of this year's ESIM was a result of several factors and their harmonic confluence.

ESIM hosted two special guest speakers from the USA: Prof. Rita Redberg and Prof. John Ioannidis. Not only the trainees, but the entire faculty, was amazed by the excellent input from both lecturers who eagerly taught us about the editorial process, including how to improve clinical research and how to publish as young physician. The programme was carefully prepared and offered the participants a variety of topics. Excellent lectures were presented by leading specialists. A total of 47 trainees from all over Europe were selected and awarded the participation in the Summer School. Every single trainee represented his/her country in an admirable way, not only trough case presentations, which were of high quality, but also by engaging in workshops and giving input on the health care system in his/her home country.

Beyond the intensive scientific work, the participants were offered a social programme to network, become inspired by the EFIM spirit and to get an impression of the local scenery.

The School could not be such a great success without the immense input from the director, Prof. Nicola Montano, and his team. A collaborative work resulted in an excellent programme, both scientifically and socially.



Executive Summary

The European Journal of Internal Medicine has again had a successful year in 2016. When looking at the various measurements, we can see increases and declines in all the right metrics.

Submissions

There has been an almost 23% growth in the number of submissions in 2016 in comparison to 2015, with a rejection rate of 73%. The highest number of accepted articles is still coming from Italy and Spain with Italy and France showing the largest increase in comparison to 2015. In 2016, there was a growth in published articles of about 30% in comparison to 2015. The Editorial handling times have remained extremely competitive, with an average handling time from submission to final decision at 4.3 weeks in comparison to 4.8 weeks in 2015. The time from submission to citable web publication was around EJIM is primarily an online journal and is being 16.6 weeks in 2016 and slightly slower in comparison to 14.7 weeks in 2015. This could be further reduced if the journal moves to Article Based Publishing which will be on the agenda at the Editorial Strategy meeting in March 2017 in Brussels.



Impact Factor

The Impact Factor in the 2015 JCR Science Edition has slightly decreased from 2.891 in 2014 to 2.591 in 2015. It is now ranking at 30 among 151 journals listed under MEDICINE, GENERAL & INTERNAL. While this drop in the Impact Factor is unfortunate, the 2014 peak at 2.891 should be viewed as an exception to the steady development of the Impact Factor performance. Using Scopus, it is too early to predict how well the Impact Factor has done in 2016.

Financials

The journal's finances have not yet been finalized, although based on an unaudited overview it would appear to have performed very well. Preliminary findings show an increase in overall revenues in comparison to the previous year of approximately 40%, with the greatest increase of around 400% coming from circulation and copy sales. While it is too early to predict the royalties in 2016, it is expected to be at least comparable to 2015.

European Journal of Case Reports in Internal Medicine, 2016

The European Journal of Case Reports in Internal Medicine (EJCRIM) has grown steadily in 2016.

The elimination of the submission fee from the start of the year has impacted on the number of submissions (increase of 45% compared to the previous year). However, the number of published articles has increased to the same extent (22%) because of a

slightly higher rejection rate (9%). The journal aims at progressively increasing the number of published articles and the publication frequency without reducing the quality threshold for acceptance. The highest number of submissions are from Portugal and Italy, followed by Spain. An increase in submissions from the US was also noted.

The editorial handling times are relatively short. The time from submission to first decision averages 10 days. Publication times average 8 weeks from the final decision to

online publication and include copyediting, author's proof approval and checkout payment. The latter two steps are responsible for most of the delays.

The web traffic has not increased from the previous year. However, indicators show a fidelization of the journal's audience. A part of the traffic comes from Facebook, which is mainly used to announce newly published articles and forthcoming events, as well as to keep the discussion open. Authors like to share their published articles with their peers, which helps

increasing the journalis reach. EJCRIM's Facebook page has an average of 3,350 spontaneous likes.

Promotion of the journal during the year was mainly focused on clarifying the importance of case reports and the format that they should have in order to be instructive for the internist's knowledge, clinical skills and decision-making ability. The Case Report Model

> and the Case Report Decisional Flowchart give guidance and a new outlook to the question "What do we want from case reports?". The model and the flowchart can be downloaded from the website and are also available in print.

A special series of videos on "How to write a case report" hosted by the Editor-in-Chief John Kellett has been produced in 2016 and is going to be issued soon, along with special issues and themed

New developments include a Quiz Section, set up in collaboration with EFIM's Young Internists. This new feature is meant to attract more readers and increase interaction.

Although indexing had not been considered a priority by EFIM, there is a high demand for PubMedCentral and Scopus indexing among the authors. EJCRIM may apply in 2017. For now, Google Scholar and CNR-SOLAR cover this role.

The nine finalists were invited to present their cases during the judging session in the Young Internists Corner. This proved to be a very popular and interactive session with some really good learning points and take home messages.

The Young Internists Corner is a new and innovate addition to ECIM, with the aim of bringing new formats, more interaction and better networking opportunities to the congress. We wanted to facilitate better connections between delegates and the faculty and invited a few select speakers to come and join

It proved to be a great success and both speakers and delegates enjoyed the more intimate and informal atmosphere. 


