

Social program


The members of the organizing committee are the alumni of the EFIM summer or winter schools.

How to reach Tartu?



Flights:

Tartu - 2 flights by Finnair a day, transfer in Helsinki

Tallinn - with bigger choice of flights (Lufthansa, Finnair, SAS, LOT, Air Baltic, Norwegian, Swiss, Ryanair, KLM, Turkish, Wizz)



Bus:

From the Tartu Airport a short bus or taxi transfer to the hotels takes about 20 min.

From the Tallinn Airport direct express buses leave conveniently for the centre of Tartu with 25 departures a day, travel time is 2 hr 15 min.



Train:

The station is on a walking distance from the Tallinn Airport - there are 10 trains per day to Tartu, travel time is around 2 hours.

Budget

The preliminary budget is calculated on 40 participants. Course fees 1250 x 40 = 50000 EUR

Costs:

Accommodation for participants (20 rooms, 2 participants per room) 6 nights 12 600 Single accommodation for lecturers 3200 Meals and coffee 14000 Conference facilities 3000 Website, secretarial help 4500 Conference materials 500 Social events, gala dinner 7000 Local travel 1000 Fees and taxes 4000
